## Introduction

#### Marimba Music for Little Kids

is a collection of songs with simple tuned percussion parts associated with them.

For the youngest children - 5 or 6 year olds - the songs involve lots of actions and only a few specific notes. If the children don't always find the 'correct' note, it doesn't matter all that much.

Several of the songs require alphabet echoes or answers. For example, 'I Wanna CCC-ee' is followed by the children playing three Cs.

Ostinatos, scale passages and repeated patterns are featured often. The children can then memorise the music and give more attention to musicianship, singing and fun.

For each song there is a suggested

age suitability. I often depart from these guidelines. Older children are happy to play simple pieces some of the time, especially if there is a fun element to it. Conversely, younger children may be ready for the challenge of a harder piece. Modify the speed of the teaching process accordingly.

When playing pieces like *Monday's Child* or *Scooby Dooby Do*, use minimal accompaniment when the children are actually singing. Massed tuned and untuned percussion playing overpowers the children's singing. I like to give them turns at being the accompanists - maybe 4 to 6 at one time - interspersed with instrumental sections when everyone plays together.

Simple arranging can make a big difference in the presentation of these pieces.

### *Click Sticks*, for example, may be arranged:

## **Can You Click Your Tongue?**



This one is for the 5, 6, and 7 year olds. There are lots of actions, some fun words to echo and just a few repeated notes to find on the marimba.

In the choruses, I ask the children to wait till the sung instructions finish before they carry them out. I see how well they manage the first chorus before attempting the second.

#### **Age Range** 5 - 7

Optional D, A and B.

#### **Preliminary Exercises**

With the little kids, we usually do a copying or echoing activity first to make sure the children are 'tuned in' and listening. Practice playing in time together on Ds and rolling smoothly on the Gs.

#### Extensions

Try making up additional 'Can you....?' verses. As well, you could try this approach:

Can you play on E ? Can you play on F ? Can you play on G ?

- And now on C.
- Very soft on E,
- Very soft on F,
- Very solt off
- Very soft on G,
- And loud on C.

## **Antigravity**

I've added a countermelody with modified lyrics.

#### AGE RANGE

8 - 12 (and older)

#### **REMOVE BARS?**

Optional. Removing high Fs for Ostinato 1 players gives them a good reference point.

#### PRELIMINARY EXERCISES

Familiarize the students with the song and countermelody.

#### EXTENSIONS

Arrange the piece creatively. You could try percussion in some sections, unaccompanied singing, adding keyboard (as on the recording), or maybe featuring a recorder or two on the melody.
