### Objectives

- ✓ Sing with head voice.
- ✓ Demonstrate melodic contour.
- ✓ Play chord bordun.
- $\checkmark\,$  Create and perform basic movement.

### **Teaching Suggestions**

### Class 1

✓ Teacher sings entire song, modeling head voice.



- ✓ Students echo song using head voice showing melodic contour of measures one and two (*sol* and *mi*) with hand gestures (high and low).
- ✓ Patsch steady beat while singing entire song.
- ✓ Transfer patsch to bass xylophone. (Alto xylophones may also play Bass Xylophone Part.)



✓ Read story. Sing song with bass xylophone accompaniment when lyrics appear in book.

### Class 2

- ✓ Create dance movements as written in book.
  - Pig jig (heel, toe movement)
  - Dog leap frog (rest, rest, jump, pause)
  - ▶ Loon silly tune (slide, slide)
  - Sheep fell asleep (snore, lay on floor)
- ✓ All students move to each animal's dance.



- ✓ Make four groups, each one assigned an animal.
- ✓ Read story. Each animal group performs dance.

#### Notes

- ✓ Each student group has a turn performing chord bordun accompaniment.
- ✓ For kindergarten students, prepare instruments in D pentatonic OR remove all bars except D and A.



### Extension

- ✓ Add a B Section. Teacher plays slide whistle (glissando up, glissando down, all high sounds, all low sounds).
- ✓ Students respond to slide whistle by moving bodies up, down, stretching high, or squatting low.

#### Why use Children's Literature in the elementary music classroom?

All children, regardless of age, love books. They look at pictures, read the words and escape into the pages of an adventure! Sound effects bring stories to life. Who doesn't want to make the sound of a "crash," "boom," "splash," or "plunk"?

In the Orff classroom, students become composers using literature. Sections can be created using words from the pages of a book, adding verses to an existing story, establishing the mood of a story using different modalities, improvising melodies to represent characters in a story, or creating ostinato patterns for page turns, introductions or transitions. Movement also brings life to characters and creates the setting of a story.

Common Core Standards and state music standards are accomplished and embellished through the use of Children's Literature. Musical accompaniments, composing original music, performing, and critiquing are easily applied through the storytelling process.

- ✓ Perform rhythms in 6/8 meter.
- ✓ Identify families of orchestral instruments.
- ✓ Perform split ostinato.
- ✓ Read melodic notation on a treble staff.

### **Teaching Suggestions**

✓ Melody

- Show visual of melody on treble staff.
- Students identify notes.
- Teacher sings melody; students echo by line.
- Sing song with new lyrics for each instrument family.

✓ Read story with word changes.

### Grade Level 4 - 5



### Orchestration

- Teach both parts simultaneously. Patsch Bass Xylophone Part with words, "play, play, play"; snap Glockenspiel Part, "That's Farkle."
- Transfer to instruments; perform.

#### Notes

- $\checkmark$  Orchestration is simple because of the tricky words.
- ✓ Both parts of orchestration could be taught as one, then split into two parts (split ostinato, see p. 38).

### Extension

- ✓ Show pictures of instrument families.
- ✓ Show pictures of individual instruments, identifying family.



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
